President's Message

hroughout 2022, our 50th anniversary year, the LatinoJustice PRLDEF team had many opportunities to reflect on our organization's impact on the struggle for human and civil rights for Latinos and others over the last five decades.

I came away from the many anniversary events and convenings we held with a renewed pride in leading LatinoJustice and our amazing team at this moment in its history, and an even deeper understanding of the bold vision of LatinoJustice's founders. I also see more clearly the thread linking the struggles we took on in the past and the challenges we face now.

I'm still riding high from the energy and enthusiasm that thousands of members of our community brought to our anniversary and signature events, several of which were held in person after two years of pandemic isolation. It was so gratifying to connect with current and past supporters, allies and partners, alums of our education programs, former staff, and to meet new friends.

That said, 2022 was also quite sobering. We saw armed men wearing military tactical gear surrounded ballot boxes in Arizona to intimidate voters; governors treating asylum seekers as pointsscoring chattel. Juring them onto planes and buses to dump them in unknown places; and the U.S. Supreme Court strip half the people in this country of the constitutional right to bodily autonomy and reproductive choice. We also saw Puerto Rico's electrical grid fail spectacularly yet again after a hurricane, five years after Hurricane Maria decimated the island, and after the Supreme Court reaffirmed Puerto Ricans' status as second-class citizens.

We will face these new challenges head on, as we always have, building our capacity, seizing the moment and expanding our reach to empower our communities at a moment when so many may feel we are backsliding on the progress of past decades. Latinos make up almost one in five people in the United States. We're ready to step up to take our rightful place in setting the agenda for our country and democracy.

ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATIONS

ifty years ago, in the summer of 1972, three visionary young Puerto Rican lawyers in New York City opened the doors of the Puerto Rican Legal Defense and Education Fund. PRLDEF came out swinging, taking on cases to knock down barriers to equitable access to education, jobs, housing, voting rights, and healthcare.

As we approached our organization's 50th anniversary, the LatinoJustice PRLDEF team knew we wanted a year of activities to look back at the service and impact of our work, and celebrate the collective effort of generations of lawyers, activists, educators, and community members who have engaged in a relentless effort to defend and expand the rights of Puerto Ricans, Latinos, and others.



Our ambitious celebration plans sent our President and General Counsel, Lourdes M. Rosado, and other members of our staff. on a Legacy Tour to seven cities where **LatinoJustice PRLDEF has history and** relationships: our home base of New York, our offices in Austin, Texas, and Orlando, Florida, and to Philadelphia, Washington, DC, Miami, and San Juan, PR. As we came CELEBRATIONS up on our Orlando visit, Hurricane lan prompted our team to switch up our plans and turn our celebration into a day of service for displaced community members. At each stop, we

reconnected with long-standing friends and allies, and made new connections to propel our work.

s we celebrated LatinoJustice PRLDEF's five decades of service, we reflected on the transformative impact of our work to defend the voting, language access and other core rights of millions of Latinos, and we revisited and renewed our strategic approach to pursue our vision for a just and equitable future for all Latinos.







Our legal education pipeline and leadership programs continued to expand and evolve throughout 2022, shifting from fully virtual programming to a mix of hybrid and in-person events. In 2022, we welcomed nine new fellows in our Corporate-Law Firm Alliance Summer Program (CLASP), representing the largest and most diverse group of students to date. CLASP welcomed two new corporate/law firm partnerships for the 2022-23 cycle and continues to have a 100% hiring rate with all fellows offered post-graduate employment by the firm where they spent their second summer. Our intensive Winter and Summer LAWboundTM programs continue to attract dozens of students in-person and virtually from across the country. In the summer of 2022, CAP hosted its inaugural John Garcia Legacy Summer Intern, Bianca Valentin, a junior at Loyola Marymount University Class of 2024, who collected and analyzed program alumni data to help assess CAP's impact. In October, we hosted the 40th annual Law Day. Our signature law school fair was hybrid and hosted by New York Law School.



Pillar Work

Economic Justice

To advance educational equity in K-12, LatinoJustice joined other civil rights groups in five cases pending in federal courts of appeal (in the First, Second, Third and Fourth Circuits) defending public school districts' use of raceneutral factors, such as socioeconomic status or zip codes. to identify talented and qualified Latino, Black, and other students of color for admission to highly selective public schools. At the college level, LatinoJustice joined more than a dozen Latinofocused organizations in an amicus brief to support affirmative action in the Supreme Court cases, SFFA v. Harvard and SFFA v. UNC. In our work to combat discriminatory employment practices, our legal team is litigating a case against a for-profit college for tolerating a genderbiased and hostile work environment and challenging a suburban government agency for racially discriminatory hiring and promotions. In Long Island, our staff has conducted workplace justice clinics and secured a settlement for seven food service workers deprived of equal treatment.

Puerto Rico

As part of our work to support the right to selfdetermination for Puerto Ricans, we collaborated with a coalition to secure the rights of those in U.S. territories and to overturn the century-old racist Insular Cases which federal courts use as precedent to diminish and deny rights to people in Puerto Rico. We filed amicus briefs and participated in public information events on a range of issues related to disparate treatment of people living in America's colonies. We have also worked to establish fruitful collaborations to support legal and activist organizations in the archipelago. We have continued to litigate Freedom of Information Act cases investigating financial governance in Puerto Rico as well as the failures to assist Puerto Ricans in the wake of environmental disasters. From our Southeast office, we have continued to support the Puerto Rican diaspora community in Central Florida, one of the largest in the states, especially around issues related to the "right to return." Our voting rights advocacy and litigation also has focused on the language rights of the Puerto Rican diaspora.

Voting Rights

With redistricting mapping, federal midterm elections and important state-level races at stake. 2022 was an extraordinarily active year for our voting rights litigation and advocacy teams. The year began with a remarkable victory in Florida Rising Together v. Lee. the challenge by grassroots Latinx civic organizations to Florida's SB90 voter suppression statute. (As of this report, the injunction is on hold pending the state's appeal before the 11th Circuit.) In Pennsylvania, we won a settlement in a language-access case, CASA v. Wheeler, just ahead of election day, to improve Spanish-language services for Puerto Rican voters in York County. We fought to uphold New York's law permitting noncitizen residents to vote in municipal elections in a process ongoing through the state appeals courts. LatinoJustice helped pass the John R. Lewis New York State Voting Rights Act and we are advocating for similar laws in Connecticut and New Jersey. Our redistricting advocacy and analysis supported improved representation for Latinos and other non-white voters in New York, Florida, and Pennsylvania. And our signature election protection project. Cada Voto Cuenta. supported the rights of Spanish-speaking voters in Florida, Georgia, New York, and Pennsylvania.





MOVING FORWARD

atinoJustice PRLDEF spent 2022 building up capacity, with 13 new hires to strengthen all our departments, including Advocacy, Communications, Development, and Education. An expanded staff will give us the space to approach our work not just more ambitiously, but also more strategically.

While impact litigation will always remain the core of our work, we understand that we cannot rely exclusively on the courts to secure and expand rights. Our work in the courtrooms must be buttressed by work in the halls of state legislatures, in community spaces, in the streets, and in the digital public square.

The challenges in the near future are great. We are preparing for the likely end of Affirmative Action school admissions. One way is by defending the efforts of school districts to expand access to specialized programs as gateways to success. Another is by doubling down our own education programs through the CAP Leadership Institute. Now more than ever, Latinos must take responsibility for ensuring that our young people have pathways to success and well-being.

We are countering moves to limit, and perhaps outright prohibit, a race-conscious approach to other areas of life, such as voting and redistricting. Our Racial Justice Project, which we hope to grow into a Racial Justice Center within our organization, is also digging deep into the intersectional identities of our communities. We are exploring how we can better challenge anti-Black and anti-indigenous biases

and discrimination from outside and within Latino communities that perpetuate persistent barriers to many members of our communities.

And we continue to extend our work as the premier Latino legal organization in the country seeking to abolish the policing and penal systems that dehumanize and harm those subjected to them as well as their families. We've seen fear fuel backlash to the promising movement that followed protests related to George Floyd's murder – for cash bail reform, and the repeal of laws that shielded police disciplinary records from public view, and more. Through legislative and community advocacy, we will continue to build Latinx voices to end carceral systems that only mete out inhumane punishment without meaningful rehabilitation and restitution.

Never straying too far from our Puerto Rican origins, LatinoJustice PRLDEF will retain a focus on supporting the struggle for equal rights for Puerto Ricans, and to support those on the island fighting for self-determination. Through litigation to demand government transparency and highlight the effects of austerity measures on Puerto Rican families, and through collaborations with island allies to investigate how to support rebuilding the island's power grid and to defend its public lands, our organization will work to bring an end to the second-class citizenship of the people in the world's oldest existing colony.

LatinoJustice PRLDEF is primed to take the fight to the next level – to continue to defend and uplift the rights of the Latino community, open up access to opportunities, and foster leadership, all in service of the shared mission to create a more just and equitable society.
